over two young men from South Africa. By obtaining a temporary agricultural work visa, our two employees come to work for approximately nine months, then return home for three months. After remaining at home for 3 months, they have the option of returning to the U.S. and participating in the program for another 9 months. The H-2A program is becoming increasing popular in agriculture across the U.S. as there are employees from all over the world that participate in the program. Farmers in the Mississippi Delta have been using mostly young men from South Africa because of their experience in agriculture and ability to speak English.

Our employees are named Jacques and Wian. ("Wian" is pronounced QUITE differently than it is spelled). Spending over twenty-four hours in the air and over two and a half days in travel, the two had quite a journey in getting here! Even though they were a BIT jet



lagged, they were very anxious to start work right away. And work they have! The two South Africans have not disappointed us. They are both very quick learners and extremely hard workers. Most importantly, they have fit right in and work well with the rest of our team at Garry Makamson Farms. The H-2A program has been a success for all involved.
